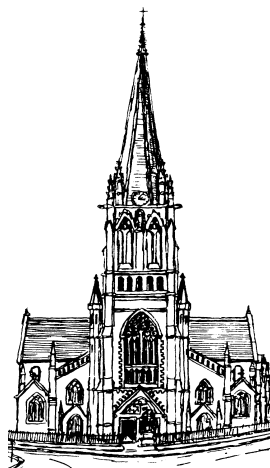

...and death shall be no more

All of us come face to face with death sooner than we might like, not necessarily our own personal rendezvous although that is always much closer than we may bear to contemplate. No, for the most part we are at some remove. We are among the onlookers and sometimes among the more closely involved: relatives and friends of the deceased, more and less disturbed and dismayed. Occasionally we are among the truly bereft, gouged by the experience of the loss of someone we have loved and needed more than words or reason can say.

Occasionally too, though, all of these neat categories and degrees of distress collapse in shock as events thrust the enormity of death right in front of us and we feel the effect physically as our very metabolism is disturbed.

In this Holy Week alone we have witnessed death at its most capricious and malign. Two moments, in Buncrana and in Brussels, have left us terribly shaken and will challenge the faith of many people in a God we so often profess to be good.

The accident that took the lives of five innocent people in Buncrana and the malice which scythed down so many more in Brussels are beyond our powers of deeper comprehension. We may seek 'explanation' but it is doubtful we will truly understand why.

As Christians, however, we believe the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus are a path through what outrages and mystifies us. God in Christ does not wave a wand to transform the hopeless situation in which he has been placed. In fact he explicitly rejects the option when he is questioned by Pilate before he is put to death. Jesus holds to another value which suggests that the surest way to resist and disempower the malign violence of his accusers is to absorb it and respond in peace. This alone will mystify and outrage many of us even more and compound our potential alienation from God who seems powerless to prevent cruelty wreak its horrors, or who seems to allow accidents like Buncrana happen far too often. We want more from God than this and we may resent being left so exposed.

But this is the paschal mystery, the focus of what we believe is at the centre of our existence: to stand in the midst of this universe, to feel overwhelmed and even defeated under all its power and yet to be able to say Amen! To be able to respond in peace and to understand, perhaps for the first time, that this is love.

This year we may feel closer to Calvary than to the empty tomb, to crucifixion rather than resurrection but Christ *is* risen; he is risen indeed! Alleluia! Alleluia!
