Parish Newsletter

Me too?

Recently I had a conversation with someone who doesn't know me very well. She was very surprised to learn that I am still a practicing Catholic. "What with the way they treat women", she said... "You know... all that stuff about not ordaining women"... Affixing me a look that was pitched somewhere between pity and derision she said pointedly, "You must know that the Catholic Church is the last great bastion of patriarchy in the Western world." I made no reply but her position resonated and set me thinking: I could see where she was coming from and perhaps I could in part agree with her... So why do I, a middle aged woman, remain a practicing Catholic? My parents were practicing and devoted Catholics. My Mother was the "active one" whose

Catholicism took the form of voluntary action in our local community. She had, as I recall, a deep sense of social justice and a belief that it was both a duty and a vocation to serve the needs of those who did not find life "easy" in material terms. The causes she took up and the ways she went around this restless seeking for justice, makes me think she was a feminist before the word was either popular or profitable!

My father was almost the opposite of this, the public arena was not his chosen place. He was very mild mannered and, at first glance, appeared unremarkable, but beneath this ordinariness was a depth of reflection. He had an ability to perceive the lavers and nuances in most situations with great good humour. In stark contrast to my mother he said very little, but what he said was usually pertinent and almost invariable compassionate. It seemed to me as I got to know him as an adult that this extraordinary ordinariness was founded on the faith to believe, that is to trust that "all will be well". I saw this trust tested many times in my childhood when my mother was diagnosed on more than one occasion with cancer and when latterly his own sight failed. He lived in this unsighted way for twenty years. As time moved on he became more and more able to receive the love and small kindnesses of those around him. I have often wondered if this ability to receive love was at the very core of his faith? Could it be that I learn from this lived example that the capacity to receive love is what makes trust, that is, the faith to believe possible?

I think sometimes I became a social worker because of the influence of my mother, but the more I stayed in that profession the more I met my father: hers perhaps the values that took me there, his possibly the ways to be there.

I am growing old and find that I am, by necessity perhaps, drawn more and more to that trusting faith, which occasionally allows me to learn (fleetingly) that I am not autonomous and selfdirecting but rather dependent on a graciousness that mostly I hardly notice. I believe in that graciousness and so I am facilitated to put one foot in front of the other!


