From Darkness Into Light

The old way of demonising of the person who committed suicide has been decisively rejected. That involved Society, both Church and State expressing, by harsh legal and religious prescription, horror at the act of killing oneself. The public way in which a whole culture distanced itself from the “guilty” person, meant that families had both to cope with a particularly intense kind of grief and at the same time bear the guilt by association. As a result, people would move heaven and earth to make sure the death certificate did not use the dreaded designation “Suicide”. Public shame may have been spared, but the burden within the circle of knowing was made all the harder for not being acknowledged.

The new way of compassion, an appreciation of mental health as contributory factor, a decriminalisation of suicide itself, the giving to the suicide the public rites of burial, addresses some of these issues. In consequence, families now feel able to name their terrible pain in public and get the support, both in religious and secular terms, that they may need to deal with their loss. This has helped us to manage publicly the particular kind of grief

that comes with burying a friend or family member who has taken their own life.

Unfortunately there has been no decrease in the suicide rate as a result, and even after filtering out the old under-reporting of suicides in the past, the numbers of people, especially young people, committing suicide remains disturbingly high. There is an awareness growing that the new compassion directed towards those affected by suicide, may put vulnerable people at greater risk by allowing them to include suicide among viable options to whatever issue they might be facing.

As Catholics we can help by being careful how we speak of those who take their own life. A simple discipline is never to present a painful life challenge as the “reason” why a person committed suicide. “He lost his job”, “she was being bullied online”. These facts don't explain a suicide. Heard by a vulnerable person, however, they risk normalising a connection between life's reversals and the acceptability of taking one's own life. Our Christian message has to say *clearly* to the vulnerable “Walk in the Light, whatever dark problem you are facing, suicide is **never** the answer”. And *gently* to the families of those whom we fail to reach with this message, “Eternal Rest Grant unto them O Lord, may that Light now perpetually shine upon them, Amen”.
