THERE ARE TWO GREAT QUESTIONS: WHAT HAS MEANING FOR MY LIFE? WHAT CAN I HOPE FOR AFTER MY DEATH?

The Book of Wisdom, written about 70 years before Jesus was born, brought a change of meaning for Jews:

"Death was not God's doing, He takes no pleasure in extinction of the living. He created everyone to be, to live".

Up to that time the Jewish faith had very vague ideas about life after death.

The Book of Wisdom was written in Greek. It used the Greek distinction between body and soul (unknown to Jewish thought). Thus:

"The souls of the just are in the hand of God, no torment shall touch them... for they are at peace" Wisdom 1,3. For good reason, these consoling lines are often used at Catholic funerals.

The teaching of Jesus elaborated and developed this evolving belief in life after we die. Jesus often used signs or miracles to reinforce his teaching.

On three occasions, by prophetic words, Jesus brought people who had died back to life again:

- today's gospel about the daughter of Jairus, a synagogue official;
- the raising up of the Widow's son (at Nain near Mount Tabor) as his body was being carried out for burial (Luke 7, 11-17);
- the raising of Lazarus, brother of Martha and Mary at Bethany (John 11).

These three gospel stories are told to support our faith in Jesus, the Christ. To Jairus, Jesus says, "do not fear, only believe"; to Martha: "I am the resurrection and the life ... do you believe this"? Jesus awaits your reply.

SECOND READING

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the **Corinthians**

You always have the most of everything - of faith, of eloquence, of understanding, of keenness for any cause, and the biggest share of our affection - so we expect you to put the most into this work of mercy too. Remember how generous the Lord Jesus was: he was rich, but he became poor for your sake, to make you rich out of his poverty. This does not mean that to give relief to others you ought to make things difficult for yourselves: it is a question of balancing what happens to be your surplus now against their present need, and one day they may have something to spare that will supply your own need. That is how we strike a balance: as scripture says: The man who gathered much had none too much, the man who gathered little did not go short.

GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered round him and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name, and seeing him, fell at his feet and pleaded with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus went with him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him. Some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'Little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat. The Gospel of the Lord.
