#### MORE THAN ENOUGH

Wild fires raging in California, deluges in Belgium and Germany, all bring destruction and devastation. We've become used to such stories. There is however an ominous note to these events. They have occurred in countries where a highly developed infrastructure might suggest that their effects could have been lessened. Nothing it seems can withstand nature's force 'red in tooth and claw'.

Climate change and global warming are now spoken of as realities to be managed, no longer prevented. A bit like coronavirus, we must learn to live with and adapt to these new forces at work in the world. It would be a great pity and a mistake if we allow ourselves to drift into a state of helpless resignation about the situation of the planet.

Today's readings point out a way forward which while apparently modest, has great potential for a profound change of behaviour which restores power to each of us in making a difference. Jesus asks the disciples to gather up the leftovers. Why? One of the lessons of the multiplication of the six barley loaves and the two fish is that there is more than enough for everyone. It is a simple but nutritious meal.

God's Providence has seen to it that nature can provide for all. The answer lies in the avoidance of waste which is the surest sign that some still insist on having more than they need, more than enough. Enough is all we need. Could it become the word that will work a change of heart beginning with myself?

#### **GOSPEL**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee - or of Tiberias - and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover. Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world'. Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself
