How odd is God....

Two things in today's gospel may seem somewhat odd.

First, it says that this deaf man had "an impediment in his speech".

One deaf from birth hasn't any speech. (At that time there were no Special Needs schools.)

Second, after the man's hearing and speech were miraculously "restored", Jesus ordered them not to tell anyone.

Could he really expect them to keep silent about such an extraordinary happening?

No explanations are provided for these oddities.

Perhaps our questions have a purpose.

The purpose and style of the story may be to focus attention on the meaning of what happened;

good things happen in the presence of Jesus.

In Jesus' presence humanity is made whole and free and new.

In communion with Jesus our damaged humanity is healed.

Do you notice the location of the miracle? East of the river Jordan was pagan territory.

It tells us that Gentiles, previously deaf and dumb to God, can now respond to him. Jesus, the Christ, is here for all, not just for a chosen few.

A reading from the letter of St James 2:1-5

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats;' then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that? Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 7:31-37

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said, 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'
