SOLEMNITY OF ST LAURENCE O'TOOLE - 14 November

Archbishop of Dublin (1125-1180). He became abbot of the monastery at Glendalough in 1150 and was renowned for the spirit of prayer he restored there, and for his generosity to all in need. Appointed archbishop of Dublin in 1161 he worked tirelessly for peace between the kings of Ireland and England and within the Church itself.

Prayer: Glendalough gave him a hunger and thirst for prayer. In Dublin, his days were filled with business but the night belonged to God. He would spend long hours in the old cathedral of Christ Church pouring out his heart to the Lord, and some of those who overheard him swore that they heard a second voice answering him. Whenever he had a little free time, he would spend it in solitude in a hermitage in Glendalough. It was prayer that guided him and fuelled him in all he did.

Pity: As abbot of Glendalough he was known for his generosity to the poor, especially during times of famine. When the monastery supplies were exhausted, he bought food from outside, using all the monastery's resources along with his own inheritance. In Dublin, in a city ravaged by war and hunger and disease, his generosity was tested to the limits. He fed the poor of the city at his table every day and opened his house to orphaned and abandoned children. At the height of the troubles, there were 200 abandoned children depending on him for food, clothing and lodging.

Peace: He knew at first hand the suffering that war was bringing to his countrymen. He spent the last ten years of his life in an endless succession of peace missions, travelling from one armed camp to another in Ireland and often making the wearisome and dangerous journey to the court of the English King. It was his defence of his people's rights before Henry II that led to his exile and his lonely death.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!

I am the good shepherd, says the Lord; I know my own sheep, and my own know me.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said: "I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd is the one who lays down his life for his sheep. The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep. I am the good shepherd: I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for my sheep. And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock, and one shepherd. The Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me; I lay it down of my own free will, and as it is in my power to lay it down, so it is in my power to take it up again; and this is the command I have been given by my Father."
