# **MISSION SUNDAY**

St Francis Xavier in 1562, a short time before his death at 46, stood on an island facing China, longing to extend the Faith in that immense country. He had already preached the Gospel extensively in India and Japan.

Bishop Thomas McGettrick of St Patrick's Society, Kiltegan, spent decades on foreign missions up to the 1980's. Once, at home on a break from his labours, he held up his right hand, and said: "This hand has poured the waters of Baptism on 60,000 new members of the Church." He said this with joy, truth and thanksgiving to God.

These apostolic champions of the faith were putting into effect the command of Jesus in the Gospel: "Go forth, make disciples of all the nations; baptise them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19).

The pattern of foreign missions has changed greatly in recent times. Social, economic, educational, cultural, climatic, ecumenical, and other dimensions are now given prominence as in areas that are outside mission territory. Always the central focus is the reality of faith, the identity of the Church, as a community following the full teaching of Christ.

Not all can be active in mission lands, but we can all play a part, by prayer, interest, support in acts of charity, welcome and material aid. This parish of St Peter's has been most prolific in its missionary commitment to our confreres, especially in Nigeria. Let us have a missionary heart, like St Vincent, who in the 17th century sent his priests and brothers to European countries (including Cromwellian Ireland), and to Africa. He himself even desired to go to newly explored distant places on mission. His love of people and of our faith speaks eloquently to us still.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here. 'So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
