SAINTS AND SINNERS

'Every saint has a past, every sinner has a future.' The feasts of All Saints (Nov 1st) and All Souls (Nov 2nd) are the feasts of the anonymous people of God, unmarked on calendars of the saints and unremembered by all but God himself. These are the feasts of our own people, our ancestors: many who kept the faith in season and out of season expressed in love and service ordinary and extraordinary who now keep timeless days of joy in the communion of saints; many more who wander still in the shadow of darkness and may not gain love's high reward till love is purified, the souls in purgatory.

These are our own feasts for one day we will join the saints and sinners and by God's grace and through the prayers of God's people, the Church, reach at last the end of our pilgrimage. In November we remember our own beloved dead and all those no one remembers. Our prayers for them are simply part and parcel of following through on our belonging to each other as members of Christ's Mystical Body on earth and his risen body, becoming the communion of saints.

Monday 1st November, All Saints Day is a holy day, Mass at 10.30am and 7.00pm (including weekly Novena).

Tuesday 2nd November, All Soul's Day, three Masses for the Souls of the Faithful Departed at 10.30am, 1.00pm and 6.00pm.

This will take place at 6.30pm on Saturday 13th November. Family and friends are welcome to attend, candles will be lit for each of the deceased and carried by a family member to the garden of remembering and prayer during the Mass.

FIRST READING

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

Moses said to the people:

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.
