# ASH WEDNESDAY

Lent begins on Wednesday next 2nd March. The Gospel of Ash Wednesday sets out the Lord's own personal invitation to each of us to set out deliberately to deepen our discipleship. Jesus gives us three tools with which to grow in our relationship with Him and through Him with all those whose lives touch ours. Prayer, fasting and almsgiving touch into our relationship with God, with ourselves and with others respectively.

The emphasis in prayer during Lent is on personal time with God — 'go into your private room'. It is an invitation to heart to heart time with the Lord and in our parish we will offer prayer support through opportunities for prayer through the Sacraments and the devotions of the Church.

Fasting is not just about food and drink. It is an invitation to greater selfdiscipline and self-control so that selfishness gives way to self-offering to the Lord and service of others. We might fast from waste in food, utilities, resources or from strife, criticism, ill-will. However we choose to discipline body and mind it should express itself in almsgiving. This might be about giving to those in need some of the money saved by fasting, supporting Trocaire which is the Irish Church's outreach to people in need across the world or giving of my time, talent and energy to a worthy cause in the name of Christ our Saviour.

# GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Jesus told a parable to his disciples.

'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye", when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.
