THE EASTER BREAKFAST

In the midst of all the imagery of war and its many horrors it was heartening to see whole towns and villages across Ukraine coming together to enjoy the traditional



Easter breakfast that is part of the religious celebration of the risen Saviour. As one couple expressed it so simply it made them feel 'normal' once more as well as strengthening their resolve. Several of the Easter encounters of Jesus with his disciples take place in the context of a meal: at Emmaus they recognise Jesus when He breaks the bread. In today's gospel Jesus tackles the sensitive matter of Peter's hurt and guilt over breakfast with fish Peter and the others have netted. It stirs memories of their first meeting when Jesus called Peter to become a fisher of men and Jesus uses the occasion to soothe away the three denials with

three declarations of love leading to servant leadership.

As in times past of trial and trouble, so still in time of present turmoil the Lord points us to the food that leads to life, the gift of God in the Eucharist, food for the journey, the Bread of angels, the Bread come down from Heaven, Christ one life who leads us forward in faith and hope.

PARISH REPOSITORY

(former Parish Office: open Mon - Fri 10am - 12.30pm also Sunday morning upon request)

As well as Mass cards for various occasions the Repository now stocks materials of Vincentian interest and related to St Peter's Church. These include cards of icons of St Vincent de Paul, St Louise de Marillac, and Blessed Frederic Ozanam, copies of the Harry Clarke window in the former Mortuary Chapel (entrance porch from North Circular Road), Care of Souls, a short history of the parish by Anne Marie Walsh, The Nine Faces of the Vincentian Family.

As this is the liturgical year of St Luke, the gospel on Sundays in Ordinary time are taken from St Luke's account. Copies of St Luke's gospel, published for the year of Evangelisation in 2010 are also available. This is a useful resource for anyone wishing to deepen their understanding of the gospel readings, and a good way to prepare for Sunday Mass. The book includes the Sunday gospel readings and a helpful commentary on how to understand St Luke. It also includes a practical guide on how to read the gospel.

FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

The high priest demanded an explanation of the apostles. We gave you a formal warning' he said 'not to preach in this name, and what have you done? You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and seem determined to fix the guilt of this man's death on us.' In reply Peter and the apostles said. 'Obedience to God comes before obedience to men; it was the God of our ancestors who raised up Jesus, but it was you who had him executed by hanging on a tree. By his own right hand God has now raised him up to be leader and saviour, to give repentance and forgiveness of sins through him to Israel. We are witnesses to all this, we and the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him.' They warned the apostles not to speak in the name of Jesus and released them. And so they left the presence of the Sanhedrin glad to have had the honour of suffering humiliation for the sake of the name.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples. It was by the Sea of Tiberias, and it happened like this: Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee and two more of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said, 'I'm going fishing.' They replied, 'We'll come with you.' They went out and got into the boat but caught nothing that night. It was light by now and there stood Jesus on the shore, though the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. Jesus called out, 'Have you caught anything, friends?' And when they answered, 'No', he said, 'Throw the net out to starboard and you'll find something.' So they dropped the net, and there were so many fish that they could not haul it in. The disciple Jesus loved said to Peter 'It is the Lord.' At these words 'It is the Lord', Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak round him and jumped into the water. The other disciples came on in the boat, towing the net and the fish; they were only about a hundred yards from land. As soon as they came ashore they saw that there was some bread there, and a charcoal fire with fish cooking on it. Jesus said, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.' Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net to the shore, full of big fish, one hundred and fifty-three of them; and in spite of there being so many the net was not broken. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples was bold enough to ask, 'Who are you?'; they knew guite well it was the Lord. Jesus then stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and the same with the fish. This was the third time that Jesus showed himself to the disciples after rising from the dead.
