GOOD SAMARITANS — NOW

We see them every day: family members assisting senior people; active persons aiding the vulnerable in shops, or across the street. A well-known charity 'The Samaritans' (founded in England, 1953) helps many people with emotional concerns.

The Good Samaritan parable of today's Gospel has inspired multitudes. The first Reading underlines the love of God and of neighbour. St Paul in the second Reading proclaims that Christ brings us salvation and peace. St Augustine sees Christ as the prototype of the Good Samaritan.

In the Gospel a man is seriously attacked, badly wounded, and left on the roadside. A few passers by disregard him; more could be expected from these wayfarers. But a man of Samaria travelling by near Jericho (a long way from home), stops, bends down, lifts up the fallen one, offers medicine for healing and soothes the pain of shock and trauma. Then he takes the victim on his own horse, cares for him at the inn, offers financial help while he must go on his way, thus insuring a happy conclusion.

In faith and charity, we find and serve Christ in other people. This is kindness in action; it is the fruit of a prayerful life, one of the great fruits of the Mass (see John 13). What can you / I do? We cannot help all in need. Pope Benedict says we oughtn't feel guilty because we can't solve all problems. We love and serve Christ in others through some activity when situations are feasible and discerned. Some material donations may be in order. A gift of our talents and time could be considered, for example in regard to poverty, Prolife assistance, homelessness, victims of war. And always our prayers and kindness are most valuable.

FIRST READING

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy

Moses said to the people:

'Obey the voice of the Lord your God, keeping those commandments and laws of his that are written in the Book of this Law, and if you return to the Lord your God with all your heart and soul.

'For this Law that I enjoin on you today is not beyond your strength or beyond your reach. It is not in heaven, so that you need to wonder, "Who will go up to heaven for us and bring it down to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" Nor is it beyond the seas, so that you need to wonder, "Who will cross the seas for us and bring it back to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?"

No, the Word is very near to you, it is in your mouth and in your heart for your observance.'

Before anything was created, he existed, and he holds all things

in unity. Now the Church is his body, he is its head. As he is the Beginning, he was first to be born from the dead, so that he should be first in every way; because God wanted all perfection to be found in him and all things to be reconciled through him and for him, everything in heaven and everything on earth, when he made peace by his death on the cross.

GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?'
He said to him,

'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied,

'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself'.

'You have answered right,' said Jesus 'do this and life is yours.' But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied.

'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?'
