THIS HOARD OF YOURS, WHOSE WILL IT BE (Lk 12:13-21)

Today's story begins when a stranger, recognising Jesus, seeks his help. The stranger takes his opportunity to approach Jesus pleading with Jesus for assistance; 'Please' he said 'tell my brother to give me a share of his inheritance.' Jesus has landed in yet another full-scale family affair. On this occasion however it is a family disagreement between the two brothers, one who is trying to persuade the other to divide his inheritance with him. However, despite Jesus' best efforts to encourage the brothers to settle their difference, it appears there is no inner desire between these brothers for a truce. Jesus intervenes again trying to persuade these brothers to see sense and divide what they have between them. However, it seems we are again caught up in the eternal family row. It appears to me that we are replaying out once again the earlier story of Martha and Mary's disagreement. On this occasion however Jesus strikes a clearer note. He urged them to be guarded against covetousness. In the earlier case of Mary and Martha their difference appears to be that of temperament rather than the issues that appear to exist between the two brothers which appears to be far more disconcerting.

As if to re-enforce the point Jesus told the brothers another parable. On this occasion, Jesus says a rich man will pull down his barns and build even bigger ones and store all his grain and his goods in them. He will continue to whisper to his own soul: saying 'you have plenty of good things for years to come, relax, eat and be merry', but ironically God said to him this is indeed Foolish talk. For as we speak this very night the demand will be taken for your soul'. What then? To be rich in what matters to God is to have a generous and open heart that sees good fortune as God's gift to be shared.

SECOND READING

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Colossians

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

That is why you must kill everything in you that belongs only to earthly life: fornication, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god; and never tell each other lies. You have stripped off your old behaviour with your old self, and you have put on a new self which will progress towards true knowledge the more it is renewed in the image of its creator; and in that image there is no room for distinction between Greek and Jew, between the circumcised or the uncircumcised, or between barbarian and Scythian, slave and free man. There is only Christ: he is everything and he is in everything.

But God said to him, "Fool! This very night the demand will be made for your soul; and this hoard of yours, whose will it be then?" So it is when a man stores up treasure for himself in place of making himself rich in the sight of God.'
