ADVENT - A NEW HEAVEN; A NEW EARTH

Christopher Hitchens (1949-2011) was assertively atheist. In his book *God is not Great* he puts humankind on notice to keep to the straight and narrow of scientific exactitude when accepting anything as fact. Otherwise, God forbid (oops!), you might end up thinking there is more to life than science. And that could be a danger to your health.

Really? Just what does science have to offer when it comes to understanding life? I don't mean the nature of living things or inanimate objects. I mean the WHY of it all. But then, why is not a scientific question. Does that mean that we should not ask it, or if we do that we shouldn't expect a worthwhile answer? I hope not.

So, let's ask it: WHY is there anything at all? Science, where art thou...? Okay, lets change tack. How about the HOW question: how will the universe end? Here science can indicate a distant, if frighteningly feasible scenario: a frozen lifeless wasteland.

Give me instead the follow-up to today's Gospel: after Christ's Second Coming, the New Heaven and New Earth!

Even if that were fantasy, let me die aglow with its promise rather than be numbed lifeless by Hitchens' scarifying scientific scenario.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah

The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, concerning Judah and Jerusalem.
