DON'T GIVE UP

Hope is really a virtue when things seem hopeless. Worth thinking about since this is when hope usually abandons us. No way forward, no solution, no possibilities left. Two behaviours characterise the loss of hope. We despair in ourselves and hit out at others blaming them. St Paul's insight is dynamic. God helps us when we refuse to give up. Hope is, in other words, an expression of faith. God is with us, we must keep going, dig deep and we uncover hope sitting on the even deeper ground of faith. And when faith expresses itself as hope we turn towards those around us with love which Paul describes in the second reading as tolerance. Or as the poet Kipling puts it so well 'If you can keep your head when all around you are losing theirs and blaming it on you...'

The cardinal virtues of our religion are faith, hope and love, all interlinked and flowing in and out of each other, deep and deeper veins of God's graces working in us to supply our every need.

ROOF WORKS ON THE CHURCH

These are now completed with the restoration of cresting and slates on the small side chapels that border the Cabra and North Circular Roads. Damaged slates on other parts of the rooves have also been repaired and the Church is now, at last, and for the first time in many years, free of water ingress. This situation will, we hope, continue and will require regular cleaning and clearing of guttering, shores and downpipes on all the rooves. A contract is now in place to ensure regular checking.

Turning then to the interior, work has begun on electrics to upgrade and secure these while plans are made to address problems with the Church floors. Much done, more to do. Thank you to all our parishioners and those who come to pray as well as visitors to the Church for your support and assistance.

LITURGICAL READINGS FOR: Sunday, 4 December 2022

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power,

a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.)

He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity,

and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land.

His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless,

his sentences bring death to the wicked.

Integrity is the loincloth round his waist,

faithfulness the belt about his hips.

The wolf lives with the lamb,

the panther lies down with the kid,

calf and lion cub feed together

with a little boy to lead them.

The cow and the bear make friends,

their young lie down together.

The lion eats straw like the ox.

The infant plays over the cobra's hole;

into the viper's lair the young child puts his hand.

They do no hurt, no harm, on all my holy mountain,

for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea.

That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples. It will be sought out by the nations and its home will be glorious. The Word of the Lord.

SECOND READING

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Romans.

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice

you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing to your name. The Word of the Lord.

GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message:

'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand'.

This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said:

A voice cries in the wilderness:

Prepare a way for the Lord,

make his paths straight.

This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism he said to them,

'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father", because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire.

I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals;

he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'
