# Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time: 19 February 2023

#### YOU MUST NOT BEAR HATRED FOR YOUR BROTHER IN YOUR HEART (Lev 19)

You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you. Matt 5:38-48

Nelson Mandela, the former President of South Africa, in his book 'Long Walk To Freedom' says that during his 27 years of detention in Robben Island, Capetown, he studied carefully the attitudes of those who put him in jail and kept him in jail without any trial. He listened with great interest to their story. He came to understand their fears, their hopes, their passion for rugby, how history had shaped them. Those 27 years of detention without trial, prepared him for the time when he would sit down with them as President of South Africa to negotiate what was best for all the people of South Africa.

He wrote about that time of detention: if you want to make peace with your enemy, you have to work with your enemy. Then he becomes your partner. He had no desire for retaliation or revenge after 27 years of wrongful detention. He used to say: Holding on to resentment and anger towards your enemy is like drinking poison yourself in the hope that your enemy will die.

In today's gospel, Jesus addresses the question of how the disciples should conduct themselves when they are faced with opposition, criticism and hatred. He quotes the teaching of the Old Testament: you have learnt how it was said: an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. But then he adds his own teaching: but I say to you offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary if any one hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well.

Love of ones enemies was a revolutionary change from the Old Testament teaching of an eve for an eve and a tooth for a tooth. Disciples of Jesus must not retaliate for wrongs done to them. The disciples must not allow another person's hostility to determine their response. Their response is to be determined by their discipleship of Jesus. Their response is to do as Christ did. He forgave his executioners while dying on the cross.

To love ones enemies is very difficult. It goes against our nature. The natural response is to lash out or give as good as you get. But to love the enemy we need the grace of God to think big and to be gracious and magnanimous. We have to be gracious and generous in our judgements of people and events. Gordon Wilson was seriously injured in the Enniskillen bomb in November 1987. His daughter Marie died beside him in the rubble of the building. When interviewed later on television he said he forgave those who were responsible for the bomb. It's a very poignant example of the living out of today's gospel message.

As scripture says: The Lord knows wise men's thoughts: he knows how useless they are: or again: God is not convinced by the arguments of the wise So there is nothing to boast about in anything human: Paul, Apollos, Cephas, the world, life and death, the present and the future, are all your servants; but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God. # A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples:

'You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you:

Offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well; if a man takes you to law and would have your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone orders you to go one mile, go two miles with him. Give to anyone who asks, and if anyone wants to borrow, do not turn away. 'You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy.

But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; in this way you will be sons of your Father in heaven, for he causes his sun to rise on bad men as well as good, and his rain to fall on honest and dishonest men alike. For if you love those who love you, what right have you to claim any credit? Even the tax collectors do as much, do they not? And if you save your greetings for your brothers, are you doing anything exceptional? Even the pagans do as much. do they not? You must therefore be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect.'
