## ADVENT — CHRISTMAS, NOW, AND HEAVEN

## Steadfast Pursuit of a Goal for Life

#### Today's Readings speak to all

A book was published seven years ago. It's title was *The End of All Things Earthly*. It dealt with the leaders of the 1916 Rising and the influence of faith in their lives; this book has a resonance in Advent. The 1st Reading (Isaiah 40) foresees the joy and freedom of the Jews returning to Jerusalem (Sion) from exile. This is a sign of God's people obeying his call and striving for heaven. The 2nd Reading (2 Peter 3) looks to the future also, even to the end of the world, painting an image of glory. St Peter here shows God as waiting patiently for sinners to repent, and avoid damnation. The way to prepare is 'live holy and saintly lives'. The Gospel (Mark 1) presents John the Baptist who prepares for Christ, and tells us the message that leads us to salvation. There is mention too of conversion. This reminds us of an Advent Confession, or two. Again there is implied the true goal for us; with a well-lived life we look forward to death and heaven.

#### Advent, the way to Christmas

Advent embraces a few major perspectives. The first one comes from Gaul (up to AD 400), where Baptism was celebrated at Epiphany; so in France, Advent had an ascetical theme (like Lent). In Rome, however, the emphasis was on joyful anticipation of Christ's Birth. We now tend towards the latter, while not forgetting the former. Going on, we continue our prayer, we do our duty, at home and in community; we keep the 'Commandments better' (1 Thess 4:1). A good way of praying through these days would be to accompany Mary bearing Jesus in her womb, and St Joseph; asking them to assist us in our family life, at work, shopping, meeting people. We can have close friendship with the Holy Family. This intimacy of relationship calls for attention and discipline; it brings us peace now, a foretaste of 'heavenly peace' (Silent Night).

# LITURGICAL READINGS FOR: Sunday, 10th December 2023

#### **FIRST READING**

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

'Console my people, console them' says your God.

'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes.' A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.'

Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah,

'Here is your God'. Here is the Lord the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him.

The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms.

A reading from the second letter of St Peter There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

#### **GOSPEL**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will
prepare your way. A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way
for the Lord, make his paths straight, and so it was that John
the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of
repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'
