God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behavior; and God relented; he did not inflict on them the disaster he had threatened. Jonah 3:1-5

The large silver cross in the Phoenix Park marks the site of the altar where Pope St John Paul celebrated Mass with almost a million people during his visit to Ireland in 1979. At the foot of the papal cross there is a large slab of granite stone with the words: *Be converted anew every day*. Pope St John Paul used that phrase from St Paul in his homily at Mass on that day.

Today's readings from the Book of Jonah and St Mark's Gospel are about being converted anew every day. Before we can be followers of Jesus we have to repent of our sinfulness and turn to God. The time has come, he said, and the Kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent and believe the Good News. Following Jonah's preaching the people of Nineveh repented of their wrong doing and turned to God. The first reading tells us: God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behavior: he did not inflict on them the disaster he had threatened. Jonah 3:1-5

Next Thursday, January 25, we celebrate the feast of the conversion of St Paul. St Paul's conversion and his subsequent following of Christ is one of the most dramatic and well known conversions in Christianity. Not all conversions are like that. Conversion happens to all of us. Our repentance for what is wrong in our lives is a process which goes on all through our lives little by little, bit by bit. It is only when we fully repent of our sinful attitudes and mindsets that we can become real followers of Jesus.

FIRST READING

A reading from the prophet Jonah

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah:

'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.'

Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words,

'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.'

And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least.

God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.
