### POINTS TO PONDER

Even Jesus struggled to find his purpose at the beginning of his ministry, but he knew how to discover it. He prayed. The one who knew God's heart better than anyone still set aside time to be alone with his Father in the darkness, to seek God's will in extended times of prayer.

Called to service, called to community, we are also sometimes called into the darkness. It is here that we meet God, and sometimes our fears, face to face. It is in solitude and darkness that we find our purpose and learn to trust completely in God's will. Being alone in the dark wilderness was not the safest place to be in the first century. For Jesus, though, it was the only place where he could talk one-on-one with his Father, without interruption. Well, almost without interruption.

The disciples would probably have preferred for Jesus to stay in Capernaum, healing from his home base, and theirs. But Jesus leads them out into their own dark wilderness: the unknown territory of introducing others to the Kingdom of God and leading them to repentance. The disciples learned that you cannot be a true follower of Jesus by sitting in the comfort of your own living room. You have to get up, as Simon's mother-in-law did, and join with others in the work of the Kingdom of God. Because for some people, we are the only Jesus they will ever meet.

### **NOVENA FOR VOCATIONS - TAKE THE RISK FOR CHRIST**

Before we begin our Lenten journey towards deeper conversion to the Lord through prayer, repentance and good works, we turn our thoughts to the needs of the Church here in Dublin. We have recently conducted a survey of the schedule of Masses in our parish grouping - this will be compiled and assessed by members of the Parish Pastoral Council. This survey was prompted in part at least by the reality of a diminishing number of priests to serve the 199 parishes of the Diocese. Without priests the sacramental life of the Church will be greatly weakened. In particular the Mass and confession will be less available to us; the Mass is the highpoint of our Catholic life and faith, uniting us with Jesus in the way He himself chose to give Himself to us and be for us the food of life for our earthly journey.

It seems fitting that we might sharpen our Lenten awareness by praying the Lord to bless our parishes with priestly vocations. To this end we will make a novena at all Masses from today Sunday 4th February until Monday 12th February to ask the Lord to help some young men in our parish to find in Him the One they wish to serve through a vocation to the priesthood. Please join in this novena each day at Mass or at home or in your school, college, workplace or place of recreation.

So though I am not a slave of any man I have made myself the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could. For the weak I made myself weak. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessing. The Word of the Lord.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped, her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.'

He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.'

And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.
