 This is the first Sunday in the holy season of Lent. The word *Lent* comes from the German word for Spring which is Lencten. So today we begin our personal, spiritual spring journey.

Spring is the time when nature begins again. During this season of Lent, we are invited to begin again in our relationship with God. God always allows us to begin again. We can't begin again with human relationships because emotional baggage could get in the way; but we can begin again with God. We are invited during the time of Lent to return to the Lord for he is all tenderness and compassion. It's a gentle invitation which contains no threat or punishment or condition - just a simple invitation, with no strings attached.

Nearer my God to thee could be the Christian motto for Lent. God invites us, during Lent, to a closer relationship, through prayer, fasting and almsgiving and in other ways.

Prayer: to give some time each day to God in prayer.

Fasting: Fasting is about getting our inner life in order. A 4th century Russian monk said: fast before the Lord according to your strength; fasting exalts the soul, sanctifies the mind, drives away the demons, and prepares you for God's presence. Fast from food, fast from little luxuries, fast from things that we don't need. We could also fast from self doubt. We could fast from negativity about ourselves or other people. We could fast from harbouring grudges.

Almsgiving: is about other people; Almsgiving is about giving something of our abundance to others, whether it is time, money or goods; almsgiving means to reach out to those living in poverty, to put oneself in the shoes of the other person, to be generous in our judgements, to be tolerant of difference.

The Ash Wednesday ashes on our forehead, reminds us that we are dust and unto dust we shall return. The purpose of the ashes is to remind us that life is short. The ashes remind us of our mortality and forces us to look at our priorities. The ashes remind us of what is important in life. *God is first, you are second and I am third*. The ashes on our forehead is a public acknowledgement that we are far from perfect, but are called to something greater with God.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Genesis

God spoke to Noah and his sons, 'See, I establish my Covenant with you, and with your descendants after you; also with every living creature to be found with you, birds, cattle and every wild beast with you: everything that came out of the ark, everything that lives on the earth. A reading from the first letter of St Peter

Christ himself, innocent though he was, died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life, and, in the spirit, he

went to preach to the spirits in prison. Now it was long ago, when Noah was still building that ark which saved only a small group of eight people 'by water', and when God was still waiting patiently, that these spirits refused to believe.

That water is a type of the baptism which saves you now, and which is not the washing off of physical dirt but a pledge made to God from a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has entered heaven and is at God's right hand, now that he has made the angels of the Dominations and Powers his subjects.
