WATER AND BLOOD (Second Reading 1 John 5:6)

'Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood.' Today is Divine Mercy Sunday and everything that we celebrate at Easter, everything that Jesus taught and did for us is a celebration of the mercy of God for each of us. Not without the ultimate sacrifice. The Easter Triduum opens with Jesus praying so intensively in Gethsemane that sweat fell from him as drops of blood. His death on the cross on Calvary culminates in the blood and water that flows from his side when pierced by the soldier's lance. Water and blood symbolising the humanity and divinity of Jesus are the source of the Church's sacraments which deepen in our lives the presence and power of God's work of salvation in and through Jesus Christ. In the waters of baptism we are buried with Christ and rise to life with him through the gifts of faith. At the Offertory of the Mass the priest while pouring a little water into the wine, prays guietly by the mingling of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.' Water and blood, humanity and divinity, the mercy of God cost God dearly. On this Divine Mercy Sunday we proclaim with Thomas our profound yet simple faith in Jesus, the well-spring of God's mercy, 'my Lord and my God.'

FIRST READING

A reading from the Book Acts of the Apostles

SECOND READING

A reading from the first letter of St John

Whoever believes that Jesus is the Christ has been begotten by God; and whoever loves the Father that begot him loves the child whom he begets.

We can be sure that we love God's children if we love God himself and do what he has commanded us; this is what loving God is – keeping his commandments; and his commandments are not difficult, because anyone who has been begotten by God has already overcome the world; this is the victory over the world – our faith.

Who can overcome the world? Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God:

Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness – since the Spirit is the truth.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you,'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.' Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came.

When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord,' he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.'

Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and

Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you,' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.'

Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!'

Jesus said to him: 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.
