They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith **Acts 14:21**

Now I am making the whole of creation new **Apoc 21:1-5**

I give you a new commandment. Love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another **Jn 13:31**

There is something exciting about new things-new clothes, a new house, a new car, a new road, a new television, a new government, a new year. At this time of the year there is new growth in nature with fresh leaves coming on the trees. I wonder what is it about new things that affects us like that. Maybe we get tired of old things and something new has a freshness about it that is attractive.

The idea of new things is running through to-days readings. In the entrance antiphon we read: O Sing a new Song to the Lord for he has worked wonders (ps 97). In the first reading there is a reference to Paul and Barnabas putting new heart into the disciples. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith (Acts 14:21). In the second reading John saw a new heaven and a new earth. The first heaven and the first earth had disappeared now. The world of the past has gone. Then the one sitting on the throne spoke: Now I am making the whole of creation new (Apoc 21:5).

Jesus says in the Gospel: *I give you a new commandment: love one another; Just as I have loved you, you also must love one another* (John 13:34-35). Jesus calls us to love one another as he has loved us. He is calling for a love that goes beyond those we like. Jesus spoke those words just after he had washed the feet of his disciples at the last supper. We are not expected to like everyone but as followers of Jesus we are called to love everyone including our enemies. That is why Jesus spoke of a new commandment. The old way was an eye for an eye and a tooth for tooth.

There is a spiritual quality about new things that seems to be very important for us. God is always new. Always youthful, always creative. God wants us to have the same quality about the way we live our lives. Sometimes it helps for us to see ourselves in a new way-to let go of old ways of relating and behaving and to be flexible and adaptable enough to see ourselves in a new way. To see our family in a new way; to see our job in a new way, to see our home in a new way; to see the neighbourhood in which we live in a new way. There is something healing about the quality of newness.

FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with praver and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.
