DO YOU SUPPOSE I HAVE COME TO BRING PEACE ON EARTH? NO I TELL YOU BUT RATHER DIVISION. Lk 12:50

In today's Gospel Jesus poses the question: "Do you think that I am come to bring peace on earth?" He answers his question himself. No I tell you but rather division. We have come to think of Jesus as the Prince of Peace. The Communion Rite in every Mass links him with peace; his discourse to his disciples at the Last Supper makes many references to peace. When Jesus appeared to the gathered apostles on the First Easter Sunday his opening greeting to them was: Peace be with you. Yet, when he answers his own question, Do you suppose I have come to bring peace on earth? He says he brings division, not peace.

In the first reading Jeremiah is in conflict with the Jewish authorities in his time. Jeremiah preached the word of God. The people didn't like what he was saying so they took him out of prison and left him to die in a deep pit of mud. They felt compelled to silence Jeremiah.

The Jewish authorities felt compelled to silence Jesus too. They couldn't live with some of the things he said and did. The message of Jesus began to lead him into conflict with the Jewish authorities. This conflict was to lead eventually to Calvary and his crucifixion.

The peace Jesus talks about is not a wishy-washy, compromising, anything-for-a-quiet -life kind of peace. When he mentions "division" we begin to see division as the price of authentic peace.

We look at the life of Jesus for clues as to how "peace" and "division" can be reconciled. The easy road to peace is to go with the crowd. Jesus certainly didn't do that. Jesus followed the road of reform and conversion and change. The road of reform and conversion and change brings conflict and division.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the Prophet Jeremiah

The king's leading men spoke to the king.

'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin'.

'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.'

So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank.

Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.'

At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death.
